ERRONEOUS EROTICISM

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- Marriage is honorable among all, and the bed undefiled; but fornicators and adulterers God will judge. (Hebrews 13:4)
- "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' But I tell you that anyone who looks at a woman lustfully has already committed adultery with her in his heart." (Matthew 5:27,28)

Valentine's Day was named after St. Valentine, who was pro-marriage, but not in favor of sex outside of marriage. Our sexually saturated society promotes eroticism and sexual promiscuity so much that it's easy for people to become de-sensitized to God's holy standard. It's an obvious example of "as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts." (Isaiah 55:9) As Christians we need to follow a different path from unbelievers.

The 39th President of the United States, Jimmy Carter, passed away on December 29, 2024. Even people that thought he had been an ineffective president were likely to admit that he was a good Christian, known for his work with Habitat for Humanity and he was even a Bible study teacher at his church. He had the temerity when asked one time to admit that yes, he'd committed adultery in his heart by lusting, but he also celebrated forgiveness and redemption through the grace of Jesus Christ. We might all be relieved that God can forgive the sin of lust.

Unfortunately, lust and love are used as interchangeable language, including in shows and songs. We often hear the word "love" but what they usually mean is lust. There is a difference. We need to realize when it comes to sex - that lust can't wait, but true love waits. Regardless of what the world claims, sex is designated for within the boundaries of marriage.

A good illustration about romantic love and sex is fire in a fireplace. Sex is like fire. It can be beautiful, warm, and cozy in the fireplace, but in the curtains it's a disaster! A fireplace in this example is marriage. Sex is a gift for only in marriage. Christians especially need to keep it in the fireplace. We can be glad there's a Valentine's Day, but we can also be glad that we know the truth about love and marriage.

The Stewardship Committee has selected collecting needed items for nursing homes in the area. Some ideas would be new decks of cards, puzzles (300 large





Word has been received that our former Pastor Robert Quillen passed away. He was our Pastor from 1970 through 1979. He supplied our pulpit while still in school and was called as full-time pastor and ordained in Gomer on July 11, 1970. Pastor Bob's interest in area youth activities helped strengthen the youth program, and membership grew during his years.

During his time with us the parsonage was relocated farther north and the sanctuary was remodeled.

Robert B. Quillen January 17, 1945 — January 2, 2025 Upper Darby, PA

Robert B. Quillen passed away on January 2, 2025 with his family at his side in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania.

Bob was born January 17, 1945 to Erma Marie (Rees) and Lee Quillen. He attended Muskingum University as a Greek and Latin major and became a pastor after attending Winebrenner Theological Seminary. He married Joyce L. Rossman on July 4, 1969 and received his Doctor of Divinity (DDIV) from Eden Theological Seminary in 1983. Bob was affectionately known as Pastor Bob or P.B. to his congregations and served as pastor to Gomer United Church of Christ, First United Church of Christ Fremont, First United Church of Christ in Sandusky, and St. John's Lutheran Church in Fremont, Ohio. He retired in 2010 with 40 years' service.

Bob treasured his family and dedicated his time to them. He is remembered by his family as Uncle Bob or Grandpa for his sense of fun, humor, and adventure, wise counsel, and many hours of patient listening to family, friends, and all those in need of an ear. He was an excellent teacher and loved spending time teaching others - whether that was chess, how to drive, woodwork or the inner workings of the human spirit. Grandpa and Dad were his favorite roles and he was counselor, in-house Uber, and

adventure enabler for all his grandkids. In his spare time, he enjoyed facilitating adult Sunday school, making pens or woodworking, and keeping up on current events.

Bob is survived by his wife of 55 years, Joyce (Rossman) Quillen, and daughters, Amanda (Nels Sundquist) and Meghan (Matt Cavas) and grand-children Zoë (Jackie Knight) Boston, Sasha Boston, Mira "Reed" Boston, Ella Cavas, and Dax Cavas, and his brother, David Lee Quillen. He was predeceased by his parents, Frank and Erma Quillen.

Bob has chosen to donate his body to science. A memorial will be held to celebrate his life at 2 pm on Saturday, January 18, 2025 at Temple Lutheran Church with reception to follow in Fellowship Hall. There will be a celebration of life for Ohio family and friends this summer. In lieu of flowers, memorials may be made to Habitat for Humanity, habitat.org.


