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"The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field. When a man found it, he hid it again, and then in his joy went and sold all he had and bought that field. Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant seeking beautiful pearls, who, when he had found one pearl of great price, went and sold all that he had and bought it." (Matthew 13:44-46)

In the theological classic, "The Pursuit of God, AW Tozer argues that a shallow, "Sundaymorning" Christianity is insufficient. He urges readers to actively pursue an intimate, transforming relationship with God, seeking Him with the same passion as a lover or a treasure hunter. To seek after and pursue God is an ideal worthy of our time and efforts. It carries with it life-changing knowledge and eternal benefits. What a joy and blessing it is that God is accessible to us! The psalmist posed a great question in Psalm 8:4, "what is man that you are mindful of him?" Let's be glad. God is intimately present and readily available to those who seek Him. Tozer wrote "we need never shout across the spaces to an absent God. He is nearer than our own soul, closer than our most secret thoughts." James 4:8 says, "Come near to God and he will come near to you. Wash your hands, you sinners, and purify your hearts, you double-minded."

Unfortunately, we often have more pressing matters along with many trivial pursuits. I recall playing a board game called "Trivial Pursuit," years ago. At one time it was very popular and they developed many different versions of it with different themes. You can easily find some type of Trivial Pursuit game at a Goodwill for \$2.99. No thanks! And I don't want my life to be about trivialities, even though there are many attractive versions available to us. The pursuit of God is a noble pastime, if only we can find the heart for it. Our relationship with Jesus is the treasure hidden in the field and the pearl of great price.

Beautiful feet

"How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" (Romans 10:15, NIV). Such beauty has nothing to do with the feet being clean, newly pedicured, elegantly clad. They may be the dusty feet of aid workers bringing food to drought-stricken areas, or the muddy shoes of those rushing disaster relief to flood zones. After Pope Francis died on Easter Monday 2025, many mourners who paid their respects noticed his shoes. Instead of new, well-polished "dress shoes," the scuffed items clearly had walked countless steps. They were the sturdy boots of a worker, a pilgrim, a travel companion on the road of life, the journey of faith. They were the shoes — the feet — of a disciple of Christ willing to go wherever needed to bring the good news of God's love. How beautiful! —Heidi Hyland Mann

Christian symbol

ALTAR — This central furnishing in a Christian worship space is usually large, with a solid front that may be decorated with



symbols or words. The flat surface, often covered with a cloth, is where the Communion elements are prepared and placed, reminding us of Jesus' sacrifice as the Lamb of God. In some churches, the altar looks more like a table, with open legwork. We remember that Jesus invites us into fellowship with God now and to the heavenly banquet for eternity. We place offerings on the altar to symbolize our sacrificial response to God's redeeming love.

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Fixer-uppers

Summer is peak time for home renovations and remodeling projects. Those can be super stressful, starting with the selection of a contractor.

In a blog about her own family's construction plans, Laura Elliott explains the challenge: "It's



not just any builder I want. I want one who has impeccable workmanship, is completely trustworthy and delivers our long-awaited [projects] early and underbudget." After sifting through bids and reviews, she discovered that most builders "look like they do pretty similar work for a pretty similar price."

For spiritual renovations, however, the choice is clear. "God is the builder of everything," says Hebrews 3:4 (NIV). Elliott writes, "Jesus is not only the *builder* of His Father's house, but He is the *buyer*, and the *heir* as well." And what he's building, she adds, is "a better Bride," his church.

Faith upgrades are an ongoing, lifelong process. "The renewal of our natures is a work of great importance," said 18th-century minister George Whitefield. "It is not to be done in a day. We have not only a new house to build up, but an old one to pull down." It's a good thing God oversees this project! —Stephanie Martin
